

Purpose

The Mental Health Commission of Canada (MHCC) is seeking a consultant(s) to consolidate past and current strategies and frameworks (national and international) on mental health and criminal justice.

Background

The MHCC is committed to supporting the mental health needs of individuals who come into contact with Canada's criminal justice system, most recently through a commitment to develop a national action plan on mental health and criminal justice. This action plan will be informed by consolidating and building on recent and current frameworks, strategies, and research to improve and transform systems, standards, and experiences in mental health and criminal justice in Canada.

Scope of Work

The scope of this work includes but is not limited to the following elements:

- Scanning Canadian academic and grey literature, including government, ministry, non-profit, advocacy, and justice/health/mental health/substance use organization websites for past and current strategies and frameworks on mental health and criminal justice.¹
- Reviewing relevant Canadian and international² strategies and frameworks, including those identified below, and summarizing the key themes, findings, promising practices, gaps and limitations, priorities, recommendations, and next steps outlined in each.
- Reporting on the current status of each item of literature and categorizing them
 according to their stage of implementation (i.e., draft, concept, proposal, monitored,
 audited, evaluated).

² Please note: the successful candidate(s) is not expected to scan for additional international strategies and frameworks but to simply review and summarize those identified in the Scope of Review section.

- Preparing a final report that includes a comprehensive summary of the literature and
 identifies which strategies, frameworks, and research documents have been effective or
 ineffective, based on the AGREE Instrument. The report should also outline common
 themes, opportunities for improvement, promising practices, and any outstanding gaps
 identified across the frameworks, strategies, and research.
- Providing files and/or links to each document reviewed.

Scope of Review

1. Topics to be Included

While the following topics are in scope, they should not be considered final. A complete list of scope of review topics will be confirmed before the work commences.

In scope:

- the continuum of criminal justice involvement
- the mental health system
- Indigenous communities and other priority populations in Canada

Out scope: youth

Deliverables and Timelines

Deliverables include:

- a comprehensive project plan (including detailed timelines)
- a review and validation of the proposed scope (this may involve reviewing academic and grey literature to ensure comprehensiveness of the scope and identifying opportunities and gaps in the proposed scope)
- two (virtual) project updates each month (to the MHCC)
- a final report delivered in an accessible Word format that:
 - includes a comprehensive summary (i.e., key themes, findings, promising practices, gaps and limitations, priorities, recommendations, next steps) of each relevant strategy, framework, and document
 - o identifies which strategies, frameworks, and research documents have been effective or ineffective
 - summarizes the common themes, opportunities for improvement, promising practices, and any outstanding gaps identified across the frameworks, strategies, and research.
- a standalone executive summary of the report (3-5 pages)

Timeline:

This project is expected to commence on **June 14**, **2022**, and be completed by **November 4**, **2022**, according to the following schedule:

- Deadline to receive proposals: May 24, 2022
- Review by selection committee: May 25 June 10, 2022
- Awarding of proposal to successful candidate(s): June 14, 2022

- Deadline for comprehensive project plan: June 28, 2022
- Review and validation of the scope: by July 29, 2022
- Twice monthly (virtual) check-ins
- Deadline for final deliverables (final report and standalone executive summary): November 4, 2022

Budget

Up to **C\$35,000**, including all applicable taxes, may be available to the selected vendor. Contract funding will be determined based on project scope, budget, and the vendor's breadth and depth of experience.

Proposal Requirements

The proposal should include the following items:

- Contact information for the main applicant: name, title, organization, address, telephone, and email.
- A list of proposed team members: names, titles, and organizations, if applicable.
- Information about the qualifications and experience of the consultant(s): Be sure to explicitly outline the following areas: (1) education, (2) relevant work experience, and (3) training specifically related to mental health and criminal justice, related disciplines, implementation science, and/or evaluation methodology (e.g., sociology, criminology, familiarity with the AGREE Instrument).
- A description of similar projects the consultant(s) has conducted: include links or examples, where applicable.
- A summary of the consultant's understanding of the requirements and criteria.
- A detailed project plan: Be sure to include
 - a. the proposed approach for completing the project
 - b. a work plan with detailed timelines for proposed activities and deliverables
 - c. a detailed budget that clearly articulates the costs associated with the specific deliverables.
- The CVs of each project team member(s) (as attachments).
- Two relevant references that the MHCC may contact: previous or current clients (preferred) who can speak to the proponent's skills and services on similar projects.
- Some French language skills (likely): required for scanning relevant strategies and frameworks in French. Preference will be given to applicants who have demonstrated intermediate- or higher-level French capacity.

Note: The MHCC reserves the right to select the proponent of its choosing, or to not proceed with any.

Recognition and Authorship

The deliverables, including the final report, will be the property of the MHCC. Researchers and contributors will be recognized in reports produced during the project, in keeping with applicable international guidelines.
